Common English Mistakes

How do you say 「頑張って!」in English?

In Japan we often hear the expression $\lceil \mathcal{I}_{\mathcal{T}}\mathcal{I}_{\mathcal{T}} \rceil$ to encourage people in sporting events or a difficult situation. However, in English, we don't say "Fight!" in these situations. If two people are having a punching fight and you want them to fight more, you can say "Fight! Fight!" 「戦え!戦え!」 but we don't use this expression in everyday conversation.

Here are some ways to say 「頑張って!」in English:

If your friend is taking a test, you usually say "Good luck!"

If your friend is nervous about the test, you can also say "Don't worry. Just do your best!" If your friend feels down because the test was very difficult, you can say "Don't give up!" But, if you are watching Japan in the Olympics, you just say "Go! Go! Go!"

Kris' movie review: Heavenly Creatures

Kate Winslet and Melanie Lynskey star in Peter Jackson's movie Heavenly Creatures. Based on a true story, it is set in New Zealand in the 1950's. It's a fantastical story about how two teenage girls' friendship **spirals out of control**; ending in murder.

Bored with school, the girls create a medieval fantasy world called Borovnia. As the film progresses the girls' relationship becomes more and more intense. So much so, that they start to believe that the characters in Borovnia are actually real. By the time the girls' parents decide that their relationship is not 'healthy', it is too late, the girls are lost in their fantasies.

Apart from the rather <u>bleak</u> ending, Heavenly Creatures is a light hearted and <u>whimsical</u> movie, which comically illustrates differences between an upper class and working class family. Peter Jackson is best known for his movie <u>adaptation</u> of The Lord of the Rings trilogy. In Heavenly Creatures he uses special effects <u>wittily</u>, making the girl's fantasy world, Borovnia come to life.

If you want to see a movie that's a little different, I highly recommend Heaveniy Creatures to you.
