Christmas spirit

Let's talk about Christmas Western Style. Of course, different countries celebrate Christmas differently. In Australia Christmas is in summer, so people often celebrate by going to the beach! In England and America Christmas is in the winter and many of the habits and customs we share are similar. It's often a big family time where families get together. Shops and radio stations play Christmas songs ('Last Christmas', All I want for Christmas is you" etc.) while in the streets you might see groups of people singing carols (traditional Christmas songs). Shoppers buy Christmas gifts and presents from stores, which sometimes stay open until late (but usually close early on Xmas Eve and are mostly shut on X'mas day).

On Christmas Day most families get together to eat turkey with cranberry sauce and vegetables, and Christmas snacks such as mince pies, nuts, fruits, chocolates and more.

It is a feast where there is so much food that you can't eat it all. There's also lots of alcohol, like traditional eggnog, wine, champagne and more! Families often eat and drink while watching Xmas TV. In the afternoon in England there is the Queen's Speech followed by TV specials and X'mas movies. After dinner a lot of families eat a flaming Christmas pudding and/or Christmas cake. (*You might be able to find Christmas puddings or mince pies in Kaldi, Jupiter or Meiji-ya).

And that is Christmas Western style! I wish everyone a lovely X'mas, however you celebrate it! And a wonderful New Year! See you in 2022, Mark



Christmas for Justin's family

We start preparing in November when we make the Christmas pudding. It's traditional to stir the pudding mix while making a Christmas wish before cooking. We send Christmas cards around the start of December to make sure they arrive before Christmas. My parents usually have a real Christmas tree and we decorate it 12 days before Christmas. Some people go to church on Xmas Eve or X'mas Day (about 10%), but we don't. Many people also buy new clothes for Christmas Day. My mum makes mince pies on Christmas Eve. She also cooks ham and prepares the turkey. It starts cooking on a timer at 5am as it takes 5 or 6 hours! On Christmas Day my family gets up around 8:30. My mum checks the turkey and we have breakfast and open our Christmas presents, which are under the tree. We have turkey (recently salmon or beef is also popular) and all the trimmings at lunchtime, with X'mas pudding, and ham and salad for dinner. When I was young one set of grandparents came to our house on Christmas Day. The other grandparents came round on
